Basement Flooding Protection Program Sanitary, Storm Sewer and Watermain Replacements on Grey Road

Expected Start Date: Spring 2016

Expected End Date: Summer 2016

**Timeline is subject to change. Future notice to be provided.*

The City of Toronto is planning to improve the storm and sanitary sewer system in your area to reduce the future risk of basement flooding and improve surface drainage conditions. This work also involves replacing a portion of the watermain and the City-owned portions of substandard water services and sanitary sewer laterals.

The following construction works are planned in your area (see map on page 2):

- Grey Road cul-de-sac (north of Old Orchard Grove) – extension of the storm sewer from Old Orchard Grove to the north end of the Grey Road cul-de-sac and replacement of the existing watermain;
- Grey Road (from Melrose Avenue to St. Germain Avenue) – upgrading of the existing sanitary sewer

The storm sewer is an underground pipe designed to collect stormwater and melting snow and release it into a nearby creek or river. The sanitary service lateral is the pipe connecting your home's sewage plumbing to the City's sewer, the water service is an underground pipe that brings water to your home; both of these pipes are owned by you and by the City. The part that you own is from your house to the end of your property. The City owns the section from the sewer and watermain to your property line.

This project is part of the Council-approved 2016 Basement Flooding Protection Program to reduce the risk of future surface and basement flooding, and the City's State of Good Repair Program to renew aging infrastructure.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT LEAD WATER SERVICES

If you live in a house that was built before the mid-1950s, your water service piping may be made of lead. Please read the attached fact sheet with important information about the risks of lead water services, especially if someone in your house is pregnant, there are children under six years old, or there is an infant drinking formula made from tap water.

WHAT TO EXPECT BEFORE CONSTRUCTION


- Work crews will mark sidewalks and curbs to be replaced and underground utilities, such as gas, water and cable.
- A Construction Notice will be delivered to affected properties approximately two weeks before work begins with an exact start date and more details about the work.
- Property owners should remove items located within City property limits (boulevard), such as landscaping and/or decorative objects. If you have a sprinkler system within the boulevard, please contact the Project Manager at 416-397-5120 or skhan3@toronto.ca.
- Work in the boulevard in front of homes and commercial properties is expected. This work includes removing and replacing driveways, municipal sidewalks and grassed boulevards, where necessary. The City will not be responsible for damage to any privately owned items on City property.



Substandard Water Service Replacement: Please read the attached fact sheet as it contains important information about lead in drinking water and water service replacement. Find out if your water service is lead – a licensed plumber can help you with this. If it is lead, the City of Toronto encourages you to replace it. We

	<p>recommend you obtain several quotes and you can contact the City's contractor for one of your quotes. Approximately two weeks prior to construction you will receive a "Construction Notice" with the name and phone number of the City contractor. Learn more at www.toronto.ca/leadpipes</p>
